

Lifeline Program Helps Eligible Iowans

Financial assistance is available from Lifeline to help eligible lowans afford and maintain basic telephone service or broadband internet service. Lifeline participation helps lowans stay connected to jobs, family, community resources, and government and emergency services.

In 2016, the Federal Communications Commission made many changes to the Lifeline program and added broadband internet to the list of subsidized services.

Lifeline provides a monthly bill credit on either one telephone service (home or wireless) or one internet service (home or mobile) per qualified household. If a customer has multiple services, only one credit may be given.

The rules for demonstrating eligibility for Lifeline have also changed. Households may continue to verify eligibility through proof of participation in Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP or food stamps), Supplemental Security Income Program (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance Program, or Veteran's Pension or Survivor Benefits. Consumers may also qualify if they can provide proof of income below 135 percent of the federal poverty level.

Try These Tips if Your Internet Connection Seems Slow

More family members using the internet for more time each day can put a strain on your bandwidth, causing slowdowns. But other factors may be at play as well. Try these these tips to see if your internet speeds improve:

Power off or disconnect devices when not in use. This includes computers or laptops, tablets, gaming systems, TVs, video streaming devices, and wireless printers. Such devices often run updates in the background, which can slow things down for your home's Wi-Fi network.

Make sure your devices are healthy. Scan your computer for malware using security software that's up to date. Malware can cause problems with your browser and/or internet connection.

Reboot your router. Sometimes a router gets bogged down, and the easiest and quickest fix to many connectivity problems is to turn it off and on again. It's also a good idea to update your router's firmware to keep it running optimally.

Replace your old wireless router. If the router in your home is outdated, it may not be able to deliver the internet speeds you expect. Replace it with a new Wi-Fi 6 router (also known as 802.11ax), which is the next generation standard in Wi-Fi router technology.



Place your router in a central location. Routers send the signal out in all directions, so if it's left in a corner of your home, a significant percentage of your wireless coverage is being sent outside. It's best to move the router to a central location to optimize the signal, as high up as possible to maximize coverage.

After you've tried the tips above, conduct both wired and wireless speed tests at www. speedtest.net. For the wired speed test, connect your computer directly to your router using an Ethernet cable. For the wireless speed test, connect your computer to your home's Wi-Fi network. If your wired speeds are much faster than your wireless ones, Wi-Fi network adjustments may need to be made.

Many Factors Can Affect Your Internet Speed

If you've tested your internet speed at www.speedtest.net or a similar site and it's not what you expected, your first thought might be to contact your Internet Service Provider. Keep in mind, however, that a number of things could be decreasing your internet speed. They include:

Multiple Devices Connected Simultaneously

Does your household have multiple laptops, tablets, game consoles, and smartphones? This can reduce the overall internet speed each device receives, since when multiple devices are connected simultaneously to the same network, they must share the available bandwidth.



Bandwidth-Demanding Applications

Applications such as streaming movies and TV shows, playing online games, and video conferencing will consume more bandwidth than things like checking email, so they can reduce your overall internet speed.

Poor Computer Performance

The culprit for disappointing speeds could be your computer—such as an old and unstable operating system or insufficient memory. In addition, if your computer is infected with adware or spyware, you may experience diminished computer performance and a stream of pop-up ads. This will likely cause everything on your computer to work more slowly.

Insufficient Wireless Router

Wireless router specification is an important factor in your home's internet performance. If an older router that does not support high speed is used, internet speed will be correspondingly reduced. For example, if you are signed up for 40 Mbps service and your outdated wireless router only supports up to 10 Mbps, your internet speed will only reach up to about 10 Mbps. Buying a new router is one of the best ways to make sure your network is as fast and reliable as possible.

Interference in Your Home Network

Other wireless devices—such as older cordless phones, baby monitors, some security cameras, and microwaves — can cause interference in your home, weakening your wireless router's signal and affecting your internet speed.

Iowa One Call

You must call Iowa One Call at 811 or 800-292-8989 at least 48 business hours in advance of construction or digging projects so underground services such as gas, water, telephone, electric, cable TV and sewer can be located and marked. Locate requests are taken 24 hours a day/ 7 days a week.

If damages occur as a result of a dig and Iowa One Call has not been notified prior to the excavation, the homeowner or excavator may be liable for repair costs, loss of product/ services, or other related charges.







Please Watch Out for Imposter Scams

According to the FTC, imposter scams—where criminals pretend to be from a government agency or well-known company—have increased dramatically in recent years. For example, someone might call you or send an email or text to say:

- They're from Microsoft or Apple and need to inform you of a problem on your computer.
- You owe money to the IRS or another government agency.
- Your Social Security account was suspended or your Social Security number was linked to a crime.
- You just won a prize but you have to pay fees to redeem it.
- Your credit card has been charged a large amount for an Amazon.
 com order and you need to call "Amazon Support" if you didn't make that purchase.

If you receive messages like these, hang up the phone or ignore the email or text.
